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

RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE CLINTON COUNTY FAIR

Conducted at the Clinton County Fairground West of Carlyle, Illinois, from July 14 through July 20, 2024.

Interpretation of the following rules and regulations is the responsibility of the officers of this Association. Exhibitors and those seeking privileges must agree to abide by the rules and the officers' interpretation of them. Any violations will automatically bar the violator from the privileges stated in this premium list.

The superintendent of each department is the absolute authority of that department. You must comply with the superintendent's instructions and requests, or you will be requested to remove your entries from the grounds, and you will forfeit any and all stall rents paid. The superintendent of the department will place your animal or article and you must not move it to another location.

- 1. PARKING Parking will be \$5.00 per car inside the grounds. The superintendent of this department has complete control over the parking of vehicles and where they shall be placed. All trucks must be parked in the area in the southwest portion of the grounds reserved for trucks. Commercial exhibitors must park in the regular parking area. Parking at your booth will not be permitted. All exhibitors must purchase an Exhibitor's parking pass for each vehicle they desire to keep on the grounds during the fair. This emblem will permit the vehicle displaying it to come and go from the grounds as often as desired without additional parking charges. Passes will be \$14.00 each.
- 2. RESPONSIBILITY The Association provides all safety measures possible and therefore will not assume responsibility for accidents or losses.
- 3. GAMBLING Gambling on county fairgrounds is forbidden by State Law and any such activities will not be allowed at the fair.
- 4. INTOXICANTS No intoxicants shall be possessed or consumed upon the fairgrounds during the week of the fair except beer when purchased on the premises from authorized, licensed beer stands or vendors.
 - 5. MORALS All indecent shows or actions are forbidden.
- 6. ANIMALS All animals, whether those of concessionaires, entertainers of exhibitors, must be under control at all times. Vicious animals are not permitted on the grounds. Any evidence of carelessness in the control of animals will make the owners and caretakers liable to expulsion from the grounds with privileges revoked. Every exhibitor must keep his pen or stall and area around clean at all times. Fairgoers with dogs or other pets will not be admitted.
- 7. CONCESSIONS Concessions and Concessionaires, including all food stands, are under the immediate supervision of the Superintendent of the Food Stands Department. He is given full authority in locating concessions, answering questions and interpreting the rules herein stated. Each stand or concession is required to pay for its own wiring; all wiring will be under the supervision of the Association. Any evidence of unsafe wring will require the closing down of the concession until safety measures are taken. All concessions and food stands will be held responsible for the cleanliness of the stand and the immediate surrounding area. All debris must be placed in containers to be hauled away by 8 a.m. each morning. This is a State requirement and failure to comply can cause the closing of the stand by State Inspector. All Concessions shall abide by County & State Health and Food Regulations. Deliveries to stands and concessions must be completed by or before 5 pm. Delivery trucks will be banned from the area after 5 pm each day. Concession workers will keep their vehicles in the regular parking area and will never drive to the concession or food stand without first obtaining special permission from the parking superintendent.
 - 8. RAINOUTS In the event of a rainout, arena admission prices will not be refunded.
 - 9. 72 HOUR RULE "Exhibits and livestock are required to be in place for exhibition on the fairgrounds

for a minimum of three days, except for exhibits and livestock in 4-H club shows, junior shows, one-day shows and in Departments C, D, E, Q, R, S, T, V, and Z. The county fair board may require specified exhibits and livestock to stay beyond the minimum 72-hour exhibition time. The number of days the exhibit or livestock must be on the fairgrounds for exhibition shall be indicated in the Premium Book (Section 260.55). If recommended by the County Fair's veterinarian and approved by fair management, early dismissal of livestock may be granted for the following reasons: disease outbreak, severe hot weather, or existing conditions which may result in the death of livestock. The Bureau may also grant early dismissal of livestock and other exhibits in emergency situations upon recommendation of fair management in the case where facilities have been lost due to fire, wind or heavy rain damage to tents and barns, or loss of electrical power, or if facilities cannot accommodate livestock due to space limitations. All eligible early dismissals shall be followed up with a letter to the Bureau.

10. ENTRIES – All exhibitors in Livestock and Poultry (except swine, beef and rabbits) limited to Clinton and adjoining counties: Bond, Marion, Washington, Madison, St. Clair and Fayette. Dairy and Beef exhibitors will need to bring a wheelbarrow for handling manure. Money for stall rent must accompany your entry blank or you will not be guaranteed space. Entry blanks are furnished in this book. NO REFUNDS – of stall or pen rental. Each exhibitor allowed only two entries in livestock departments. Exhibitors in agriculture, textiles and like departments may have a later deadline and should check their departments. A separate entry blank must be used for each department. All livestock exhibitors must check their individual departments for the time the livestock must be on the grounds. See to the welfare of your stock, then consult with the superintendent on any question you have.

Your stall or pen will be marked – use no other. No advance information concerning entries will be divulged. All animals must be entered in the name of the true owner; registration papers will be checked during judging by the committee. All applications for entry of cattle must give the name and address of breeder, name, number, age, and date of birth of the animals to be exhibited. Animals exhibited must be recorded with their respective breed association in the name of the bona fide exhibitor previous to the date of showing.

PREMISE I.D. NUMBER (LIVESTOCK/FOWL/EQUINE)

If stabled in Illinois, REGISTER online at IDOA's website: www.agr.state.il.us/premiseid and receive Premise I.D. number instantly. For questions or an application, call IDOA at: 1-866-299-9256, TTY: 217-524-6858; or FAX: 217-558-6033.

- **11. OWNERSHIP** Animals owned in partnership must be entered in all classes in the partnership name as it appears on registry papers. No animals registered under a partnership name may be exhibited in the name of an individual member of said partnership. Farm, firm, company or corporation names shall be defined as partnership under this rule even though only one owner is represented.
- **12. ERRONEOUS ENTRY** Exhibits that have been erroneously entered may, at the discretion of the management, be transferred to or from their proper classes prior to the judging. If such classes have been judged, they shall not be reopened, and ineligible entries will be disqualified.

CONDUCT IN LIVESTOCK AREA

- 1. Absolutely nothing (including horse trailers, campers, tents, trucks, and cars) is to be parked or placed in the areas between the livestock barns, or in the area north of the livestock barns.
- 2. Do not pick your own stall or pen space. The superintendent has full charge of this matter.
- 3. Handlers must keep livestock tents in order. Feed and bedding as well as personal items should be neatly placed so as to leave a clear passageway that will invite patrons to pass through and see the stock.
- 4. All animals occupying stalls must be entered in the fair and will be charged pen rent.
- 5. Facilities will be provided for hauling away refuse. Your superintendent will instruct you how to best facilitate this matter.
- 6. Exhibitors must not bring excessive amount of feed on the grounds. Exhibitors of purebred stock are required to have registration papers at all times and exhibit them to the superintendent or persons designated by him on request.
- 7. All Exhibitors must be at least 8 years old to show animals in ring. All superintendents must be present for livestock count.

2024 RULES & REGULATIONS

- 1. Superintendents or persons designated by them are responsible for deciding whether entries are being made in the proper classes.
- 2. The judges at the fair are competent in the fields and owe no favoritism to anyone. Therefore, exhibitors are cautioned to state their questions in a reasonable manner and without abusive language.
- 3. No premiums will be awarded on animals or articles, which the judges deem unworthy.
- 4. Should the death of any animal occur on the grounds, the owner or handler must remove it immediately.
- 5. Any articles or stock left on the grounds that are not claimed before July 31 become the property of the Association and will be disposed of by the secretary immediately after that date.
- 6. Bring your own watering buckets, as State Law prohibits watering from troughs or tanks.
- 7. Any exhibitor who is guilty of acts of indecency, profanity, misconduct, or failure to keep pens, stalls, livestock, and equipment clean and neat must forfeit all premiums.
- 8. The Fair Board has privilege to reject any exhibit that arrives late, if there is not stall room, pen room, or tent room.
- 9. All exhibitors must supply their own light bulbs.

PREMIUMS

- 1. Premiums will be paid by check and will be available at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, July 20 in the Arts and Science Building. All livestock premiums checks will be ready at the time the animals are released. No premiums can be released before that hour.
- 2. All premiums uncalled for thirty days after the fair, or premium checks not cashed by that date, shall be deemed donations to the fair.
- 3. A protest on an award must be made in writing before the last day of the fair accompanied by an affidavit setting forth the grounds for protesting the award. A deposit of \$25 shall accompany the protest. If the protest is sustained the money will be returned. However, if the protest is overruled, the money will be forfeited to the Association.

RELEASE

1. All items must be removed within 24 hours of close of fair.

ILLINOIS DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH DIVISION OF FOOD AND DRUGS FOOD STANDS

Any food stand using eggs in any form must contact the fair office to obtain copies of Illinois Department

of Public Health regulation concerning the handling of eggs. New rules concerning outbreaks or potential outbreaks of Salmonella became effective September 2, 1988, and precautions in handling eggs must be strictly enforced.

TEMPORARY FOOD SERVICE ESTABLISHMENT REGULATIONS

The following items are required for compliance with the Illinois Department of Public Health's Food Service Sanitation Rules and Regulations pertaining to operation of a Temporary Food Service Facility at fairs, carnivals, and other public gatherings.

- **1. FOOD SUPPLIES:** All food supplies including meat, milk, vegetables, etc. shall be obtained from sources complying with applicable State Laws and Regulations. All food shall be clean, wholesome, and free from adulteration and misbranding. Home-canned foods will not be permitted. All fruits and vegetables shall be washed before being used. Food stands, which freeze dairy products, must have a "Certificate of Approval" from the Division of Food and Drugs.
- **2. PERSONAL HYGIENE:** Personnel with boils, cuts, respiratory infections and communicable disease shall not be permitted to work in a food stand. Fingernails shall be trimmed; hands and arms shall be washed and clean before starting work, washed after visiting toilet and washed as frequently as necessary during the day. Employees shall wear clean outer clothing. All female employees shall wear hairnets. Male employees shall wear caps and if hair is kept long, a hairnet shall be worn also. Smoking or other use of tobacco is not permitted by food stand personnel in food preparation or sales areas.
- **3. HANDWASHING FACILITIES:** Convenient and adequate hand washing facilities shall be provided for each establishment. The minimum facilities shall consist of a pan, water, soap and individual towels. COMMON TOWELS ARE PROHIBITED.
- **4. MENU RESTRICTIONS AND FOOD PREPARTION:** Potentially hazardous food such as cream-filled pastries, custards, cream pies and meat, poultry, and fish in the form of salads or sandwiches shall be prohibited. The preceding does not apply to hamburgers, frankfurters and other food, which prior to service requires just seasoning, and cooking.

Fresh pork and poultry must be heated throughout to a minimum internal temperature of 165 degrees F. Chicken pies, chicken fricassee, and chicken and noodles shall not be prepared or served.

All hamburgers intended for use in sandwiches shall be purchased in patty form only. Hams including "precooked ham" shall be thoroughly cooked prior to serving. Potato salad shall not be prepared or served. Leftover potentially hazardous food including sandwiches shall not be offered for sale the following day.

- **5. REFRIGERATION AND FOOD TEMPERATURES:** Potentially hazardous food, which consists in whole or in part, of milk or milk products, eggs, meat, poultry and fist shall be maintained at temperatures of 45 degrees F. or below 140 degrees F. or above. Only mechanical refrigeration shall be permitted for maintaining refrigeration temperatures.
- **6. FOOD AND DRINK STORAGE AND DISPLAY:** All food supplies shall be stored off the ground on pallets or shelves. All food shall be properly covered to prevent contamination from dust, insects, droplet contamination, etc.

Wet storage of packaged food and beverage is prohibited. Pressurize containers of soft drinks may be stored in ice water if the water contains at least 50 ppm of available chlorine and if the water is changed often enough to keep both water and containers clean.

All food on display, such as cotton candy, candied apples, etc., shall be covered or be individually packaged to prevent contamination from dust and other elements.

- **7. CONDIMENTS:** Sugar, mustard, catsup, and other condiments shall be individually packaged or dispensed from an approved dispenser.
- **8. ICE SUPPLY AND HANDLING:** Ice that is consumed or which will come in contact with food shall be obtained from an approved source in chipped, crushed, or cubed form and transported and stored in a single service, closed container bags.

Containers for storage of ice on location shall be constructed of easily cleanable materials, equipped

with a drain and provided with overlapping tight-fitting covers. Dippers and scoops shall be used in dispensing of ice. Hand dipping of ice is prohibited.

9. WATER SUPPPLY AND STORAGE: An adequate supply of safe sanitary water for drinking, food preparation, hand washing and cleaning utensils and equipment shall be provided in the food stands. Wherever possible a pressure supply system is recommended. Hot water shall be made available for cleaning purposes.

If water under pressure is not available in the stand, water storage containers shall be constructed of an approved type material, possess tight-fitting overlapping covers and have a dispensing valve, which is of a cleanable construction. Water containers constructed of wood shall be prohibited.

10. MULTIUSE EATING AND DRINKING UTENSILS: The manual washing of plates, glasses, cups, and silverware is prohibited. Only single service tableware and utensils shall be used, including cups, plates, and eating utensils. Facilities shall be provided for washing pots, pans, and similar utensils.

All single service articles shall be properly stored to prevent contamination. Single service cups shall be stored and dispensed through approved tube dispensers to avoid contamination or surfaces in contact with the mouth of a customer. Only individually wrapped drinking straws shall be used.

11. FOOD EQUIPMENT CONSTRUCTION AND CLEANLINESS: Only food equipment which is in good repair and cleanable shall be used.

Food-contact surfaces shall be corrosion resistant, non-absorbent, nontoxic, and free of breaks, open seams, chips, pits, and similar imperfections. Galvanized containers shall not be used for preparation, display and storage of acid drinks. Appropriate scoops, tongs, spoons, and forks shall be provided to minimize manual contact with food.

After each usage, all kitchenware and food-contact surfaces of equipment, exclusive of cooking surfaces, used in preparation, serving, display or storage of food, shall be thoroughly cleaned to sight and touch. All counters and shelving shall be kept clean and presentable at all times.

12. LIQUID AND SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL: All liquid waste shall be disposed into public sewers in such a manner as not to create a public health hazard or nuisance condition.

An adequate number of approved garbage container with tight-fitting lids shall be provided at each stand.

It shall be the responsibility of each food stand owner or operator to keep the grounds surrounding his stand free of food scraps, paper and other debris.

13. FOOD STAND CONSTRUCTION: Kitchens and food preparation areas shall have ceilings and sides so constructed as to minimize the entrance of insects and dust. Ceilings and sides may be of wood, canvas or other materials, which will protect the interior of a food stand from the elements.

Effective shielding shall be provided consisting of glass or other durable materials where necessary to prevent contamination of food and food preparation equipment from dust, rain, flies, insects, consumer handling, and other elements. These restrictions also apply to concessionaires distributing free food samples.

Kitchens and food preparation areas not located on concrete or asphalt surfaces shall have temporary flooring constructed of wood and elevated to prevent employees from working in mud and prevent contamination of food by dust, must, etc. Sawdust shall be used as a floor covering. Flooring in outdoor permanent stands shall be maintained in good repair.

All wood framing shall be freshly painted, in good repair and maintained in a clean condition. All canvas shall be in good repair and maintained in a clean condition.

The preceding will be subject to approval by the inspection agency when the food stand is assembled.

14. UTILIZATION OF FOOD SERVICE FACILITIES LOCATED OFF THE FAIRGROUNDS: Facilities such as church kitchens and commercial restaurants, etc., which are utilized for off the grounds' preparation of food service shall be inspected prior to the fair and shall meet the Food Service Sanitation Regulations of the Illinois Department of Public Health.

2024 Exhibition Livestock Health Requirements

County Fairs

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

These Exhibition Health Requirements apply to all livestock present at the fair including those animals that are not entered in competitive events.

- 1. Exhibitors are required to familiarize themselves with all rules applicable to their exhibits.
- All out-of-state animals shall require an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.
- 2. All animals, except as noted, shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) which shows that the animal meets all health requirements for the State of Illinois. CVI's shall be made available to Bureau of Animal Health Personnel on request. If an official electronic CVI is utilized, the exhibitor should be able to log on and show Bureau of Animal Health Personnel the completed CVI.
- CVI means a legible record made on an official form from the state of origin which has been issued, signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian and which shows the name and address of the animal's owner or exhibitor and the results of all required tests or vaccinations. A CVI shall list only one animal identification per line; shall be presented on the form on which it was initially issued; and shall not be corrected, changed or altered in any manner.
- 3. All animals shall be officially identified. The animal(s) official identification shall be recorded on the CVI.
- Animal identification number (AIN): A numbering system for the official identification of individual animals in the United States that provides a nationally unique identification number for each animal. The AIN consists of 15 digits, with the first 3 being the country code (840 for the United States or a unique country code for any U.S. territory that has such a code and elects to use it in place of the 840 code).
- 4. If animals are from tuberculosis accredited, brucellosis certified, pseudorabies qualified, or brucellosis validated herds, the identifying herd number(s) along with the date of the last herd test(s) shall appear on the CVI.
- 5. CVIs for out-of-state livestock shall be void thirty (30) days after issuance.
- 6. CVIs for Illinois-origin livestock shall be void ninety (90) days after issuance.
- 7. All livestock shall be subject to examination upon entry to any Illinois fair or exhibition. Any animal showing evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases shall be immediately withdrawn and held in quarantine at the owner's risk and expense until properly treated and recovered, or until the animal is released to return to the owner's premise.
- Any livestock infected with scabies, mange, active lesions of ringworm, soremouth, or multiple warts which are easily visible without close examination shall not be permitted to exhibit and are subject to quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds.
- Sheep and goats with caseous lymphadenitis as evidenced by draining abscesses shall not be exhibited and are subject to immediate quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds.
- In the event of the suspicion of or diagnosis of a foreign animal disease, emerging animal disease, or other actionable disease, animals may be subject to quarantine on the fairgrounds until such time that it is determined that the disease is no longer a threat.
- 8. Illinois Department of Agriculture personnel or designee may collect blood, tissue, milk or urine samples from any animal being exhibited and/or raced at any Illinois fair to test for the presence of illegal drugs or banned substances. Examination techniques, such as ultrasound, may also be used at anytime while the animals are on the grounds of any Illinois fair or exhibit.
- The Illinois Department of Agriculture or designee may collect urine, blood, tissue or other test samples from exhibition animals at the time of slaughter.
- 9. All exhibitors of animals at any Illinois fair or exhibition shall comply with the provisions of the Illinois Humane Care for Animals Act. If violations are observed, the animals(s) will be excused from exhibition and ordered removed from the grounds with all awards being forfeited.

Any practice or deviation from normal, accepted care, including physical, medical or mechanical application, shall constitute a violation of show rules and may result in the animal(s) disqualification and removal from the fairgrounds.

10. Any Illinois cattle, bison, cervidae or goats being exhibited in non-accredited free states must be isolated from the remainder of the herd/flock upon return to Illinois and retested for tuberculosis 60-120 days postentry.

CATTLE

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be either a fully healed and legible tattoo, approved official ear tag, registration number (can only be used if the tattoo is recorded on the registration certificate or for breeds where pictures are acceptable), or individual brands, if brand is recorded on the registration certificate. Beginning in 2025, individual identification of each animal shall be by a USDA official animal identification number ear tag, ("840" tag). The tag must be able to be read both visually and electronically. Illinois Cattle

Brucellosis

Illinois is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois cattle.

Tuberculosis

Illinois is an Accredited Tuberculosis- Free State. Tuberculin testing is not required for Illinois cattle.

Please note: Illinois calves under 6 months of age are not required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

Out-of-State-Cattle

All out-of-state cattle are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

Brucellosis

- 1. Female cattle six (6) months of age and older and bulls eighteen (18) months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within thirty (30) days prior to entry, unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
- A. Originate directly from a certified brucellosis-free herd.
- B. Official vaccinates of dairy breeds under twenty (20) months of age or official vaccinates of beef breeds under twenty-four (24) months of age.
- C. Animal originated from a "Class Free" state (if entire state is so classified)
- D. Steers and spayed heifers are not required to be tested for brucellosis.
- 2. The negative brucellosis test shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory within 30 days prior to exhibition.

Tuberculosis

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis Free States
- A. No tuberculin test required. All cattle, including steers, originating from an Accredited Tuberculosis Free State, may enter Illinois for exhibition when accompanied by a CVI issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days.
- 2. Non-Accredited Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
- A. Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past year.
- B. The individual animals entering Illinois must be negative to an additional tuberculin test conducted within 30 days prior to exhibition.
- C. Cattle that enter Illinois for exhibition and remain in Illinois (animal does not return to the state of origin within 30 days) must be isolated and retested for TB 60-120 days from the last official TB test date.

SWINE

Illinois Swine Identification

- 1. Swine shall be identified by an official ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch.
- 2. Ear notch identification is acceptable for all barrows, crossbred gilts and breeding swine.

(Note: Ear notch identification of crossbred swine does not satisfy USDA identification requirements for interstate

movement or official testing.) **Beginning in 2025, individual identification of each animal shall be by a USDA official animal identification number ear tag, ("840" tag). The tag must be able to be read both visually and electronically.**

Brucellosis

Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois swine.

Pseudorabies

Pseudorabies testing is not required for Illinois swine.

Out-of-State Swine

All out-of-state swine are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

Identification

- 1. Individually identified by an official ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch.
- 2. Ear notch identification is not acceptable for crossbred animals.

Beginning in 2025, individual identification of each animal shall be by a USDA official animal identification number ear tag, ("840" tag). The tag must be able to be read both visually and electronically.

Brucellosis

- 1. Breeding swine 4 months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
 - A. Originate immediately and directly from a validated brucellosis-free herd.
 - B. Originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free state.
- 2. Swine brucellosis tests for exhibition shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory.

Pseudorabies

- 1. Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage IV or V state are exempt from the pseudorabies testing requirement.
- 2. Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage III state shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within thirty (30) days prior to entry or originate immediately and directly from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd.
- 3. Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage I or II state shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within the 10 days prior to entry.
- 4. Barrows and females in market classes must meet the same requirements as breeding swine.

SHEEP

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo or official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.

Ear tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal. When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database.

MARKET LAMBS

All market lambs must be slick shorn (show ring ready) before weigh-in so that show lamb fungus can be identified.

ILLINOIS SHEEP

- 1. Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.
- 2. The CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

OUT-OF-STATE SHEEP

All out-of-state sheep are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

- 1. Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.

- 1. Open to Clinton County residents & tractors and Bond County residents & tractors.
- 2. Entry fee is due at the time of sign in. Entry fee \$25.00 per hook. One pit pass wrist band per paid entry. Sign in will take place at the fairgrounds from 3:00 p.m. until 5:30 p.m.
- 3. All winners must give their social security number in order to receive their premium check.
- 4. Tractors must be weighed on scales at the Clinton County Fairgrounds in Carlyle between 2:30 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. on the day of the pull and the driver must be weighed with the tractor. Scale width is 8 feet 6 inches. Tractors will be weighed again immediately before the pull on the track.
- 5. All drivers must be 18 years of age or older. Those under 18 must have written permission of parent or guardian.
- 6. Tractors must adhere to the following guidelines. Driver will have 75 feet to adjust speed till horn stops. If horns blows after 75 feet, tractor is disqualified and pull is over.
- 7. All tractors must have their own drawbar. No switching of drawbars.
- 8. Tractors must be operated in a safe manner at all times. No riders on any tractor in pit, track, or adjacent areas.
- 9. Driver must remain seated at all times and maintain complete control of the vehicle at all times.
- 10. Rain date will be at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- 11. The judges' decision will be final on all matters and the judges have the authority to disqualify any contestant for being unduly argumentative, using profane or abusive language, or for using or being under the influence of alcohol or drugs. The superintendent reserves the right to refuse any tractor or operator. No refunds on disqualifications.
- 12. No one is permitted to be on the track except for the track officials and contestant when the vehicle is under the green flag.
- 13. Tractor must start pull with a tight chain. No jerking permitted. Contestants will be allowed a total of two hooks and 75 feet to start the sled. If the driver lets off the throttle before 75 feet, he may have a second attempt. If no effort is made to back off the throttle, no second attempt will be given. An attempt is defined as moving the sled a measurable distance of 1" or greater.
- 14. Number 1 puller will be the test puller and may take pull if weight transfer is deemed right or they may come back in the 6th position to pull again. All decisions on re-pulls are to be made before vehicle leaves the track.
- 15. Pulling vehicle must remain within the boundaries of contest course during the pull or will be disqualified.
- 16. Pull shall be considered over when forward motion of the load stops and the judge raises the red flag. Judges shall hold hole digging to a minimum.
- 17. Excessive loss of liquid, ballast weight, and any parts lost that can cause a safety problem by pulling a vehicle while in forward motion, under the green flag, will be cause for termination of pull or red flag.
- 18. Minimum drawbar length 18" from center of rear axle to point of hook. Drawbar to be stationery in all directions and parallel to ground at 20" height in all classes. The area (5" wide and 12" high) immediately above and below the drawbar must be free of all obstructions, including weights.
- 19. No additional weights will be permitted after weigh-in. Weights must be securely fastened to tractor. Weights will not be permitted on platform, cab, or 3 point top link. Weight includes driver. Weights must not extend rearward beyond rear tires. No quick hitches or bars allowed on 3 PT arms.
- 20. No dual wheel tractors allowed.
- 21. Only standard equipment excepting drawbars, will be permitted. This is to include motors, carburetors, governors, ignition system and factory equipped blowers. Tractors must be equipped with standard wheels for tractor. Rims cannot exceed tire size. Rim and Tire sizes are found under item 6 in these rules.
- 22. If committee doubts legality of stock entry, contestants must verify 500 units of tractor in question have been manufactured (notarized statement from the manufacturer), furnish part numbers and prove to the committee's satisfaction that they have legal entry. Stock block tractors are tractors having standard block and crankcase for make and model being

entered. Chassis must conform with engine being entered.

- 23. No added LP gas injections or alcohol.
- 24. No added blowers for 7000, 8000, and 9500 pound classes. Blowers allowed on factory style manifolds for 11,000, 13,500 and 17,000 pound classes.
- 25. No 4-wheel or M.F.D. tractors allowed.
- 26. All tractors must have a workable PTO. Winners may be subject to dynamometer check. Tractors will be allowed stock RPM and are subject to being checked by track officials. Tractors are allowed 25% more than manufacturer's estimated HP.

If tractor is legal, puller gets 75% of protest money and 25% for dyno use. If tractor is illegal, protestor gets 100% refund and puller pays 25% for dyno use. Protester must be driver in the class.



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

- Wheel base. 133", Trucks 133"-140" will drop 200lb or 2" of hitch height, over 140" will drop 200lb and 2" hitch height.
- Tires. 35 x 12.50 maximum. Must be DOT approved, No cutting or Sipping. Rear tires must track at least half of front tires.
- Total weight bar distance is 60" measured from centerline of front axle to furthest object forward. Front tow point on weight bar may be no larger than 5"out X 12" wide and 1" thick and will not count as weight bar distance.
- Draw bar or Reese hitch must be no less than 42" from center line of rear axle to chain hook point. No mid mount hitches. No hook points forward from centerline of rear axle. Actual hook point 3"x3.75" horizontal hole

with 1.5"x1.5" max at hook point. No higher than 2" above frame rail. Hitch height 26" and must be rigid in all directions. Bars allowed from hitch to rear axle but must be attached below center line of the axle tube.

- Must have OEM truck body. If bed is gutted must have bed cover. No flat beds, duallys, or fiberglass bodies. Fiberglass hoods and race seats allowed. Anything in the cab that can be unbolted may be removed. Must have OEM glass for windshield and back window.
- Must have OEM firewall and floor pans, or firewall and floor pans made from 18-gauge steel or 3/16 aluminum. Any open holes must be plugged.
- Hydraulic steering is allowed
- Fuel cells allowed, May be on weight bracket or in/under the bed. No fuel cells or fuel lines will be permitted in the cab.
- Must have working front brakes
- All engines will have a seal installed at the first event. The top 3 trucks will be pump tested at the end of the season. In the event a competitor wishes to protest against another truck, a protest form must be completed, and \$250 fee must be levied. \$50 will go to the pump tech. If the protested truck pumps over 500 cubic inches + 1% (or 540 for Iron headed trucks) the complainant will receive \$200 back and the Accused will not be allowed to compete for points or prize money until the issue is resolved. If the engine pumps within limits the accused will receive the \$200.

8500# Work Stock Diesel

- 1. CHASSIS; OEM chassis is mandatory. The engine must be in the OEM location for the body used. The vehicle must retain the full OEM chassis. Wheel tubs, back half conversions, tube chassis etc. are prohibited.
- 2.BODY; The body must be OEM truck body, including the full bed floor. The body must retain full sheet metal. Metal aftermarket hoods are permitted. No Fiberglass hoods. The hood must be securely closed and latched while truck is hooked to sled. Complete OEM firewall and floor pan are mandatory. Stock appearing front bumper.
- 3.Engine; The engine is limited to a stock appearing, no deck plates are allowed, SFI balancer and hardware, OEM make-specific compression ignition engine. The engine is limited to any diesel engine available in a 1 ton or smaller truck. Transplanting is allowed- Cummins into a Ford etc.
- 4. Fuel Injection Pump; The fuel injection pump is limited to a stock appearing, OEM engine make specific pump only. The use of multiple high- pressure common-rail fuel pumps are allowed. Power Stroke engines with a single factory turbo may utilize a second HPOP. Pumps from different years in the same engine model may be interchanged.
- 5. Turbocharger; Open S300 Borg-Warner- T4 foot max with T4 bolt pattern. Must be Borg Warner front to back. No billet center sections. No cut/welded exhaust housing or compressor housings. 4 inch compressor inlet. Exhaust housing must be visible for inspection. Stock appearing may run Borg Warner S300 center section. No billet centers. Recast covers allowed must be OEM dimensions. No S400 parts allowed. 6.4 power stroke both turbos must be stock appearing.
- 6. Fuel; The fuel must be pump #1 or #2 diesel only. Soy/ Bio-diesel fuel is permitted. Off-road diesel fuel is prohibited. Fuel cell in bed only.
- 7. Exhaust; All trucks must be equipped to direct the exhaust upwards. The exhaust must exit rearward of the driver compartment. Stack thru the hood or fender are prohibited. Two 3/8 bolts must be installed through the exhaust pipe in a cross pattern within a inch of one another as close to turbo as practical.
- 8. Drive line; OEM transmission and transfer case are mandatory. They must have been and option in 1 ton or smaller truck.
- 9. Transmission- Transfer case; Non-OEM transmissions are prohibited. Automatic- aftermarket converters, valve bodies and internal components are permitted. Transmission brakes are prohibited. Any non-OEM floor mounted automatic transmission shifter must be equipped with a spring-loaded positive reverse lockout device to prevent shifter from accidentally being put in reverse. A functional neutral safety switch is mandatory. Manual; Aftermarket internal components are permitted. SFI bell housing or SFI blanket required. Transfer-case; Non OEM transfer cases are prohibited. It must have been an option in a 1 ton or smaller truck.
- 10. Suspension Front; The upper mounting point from the strut assemblies must be in factory location. Adjustable

caster/camber pillow ball mounts are permitted. The lower control arm may be strengthened providing factory mounting points to chassis are maintained. The lower mounting point for the strut assembly may be modified for improved caster or camber. Stut tower braces, lower tie bars, sway bars, and limit straps are permitted. Traction bars and devices are permitted.

- 11. Suspension Rear; An OEM- style suspension is mandatory. Lowering or raising the trucks height with suspension modifications is permitted. Traction bars and devices are permitted; they must bolt on only, welds are allowed for attachment to frame or axle housing. Control arms may be strengthened or replaced provided all original mounting points are retained. All rear suspensions must use at least on working shock absorber per wheel.
- 12. Rear- End; Non-OEM rearend housings are prohibited. The rear end must have been an option on a 1 ton or smaller truck. Rear axle bolts must be covered by cap or shield.
- 13. Driveshaft Loops; All trucks must have at least six inch wide u-joint shields around the rear u-joint constructed of at least 1/4 steel or 3/8 aluminum that will contain the u-joint and the end of the shaft. All shields must be securely mounted to the vehicle. All front shaft u-joints that are visible from the side of the truck must be shielded to contain u-joint and end of shaft.
- 14. Tires; The tires must be DOT street tires. Cuts are prohibited. Single wheel trucks 4- 35 inch max tire or metric equivalent. Dual wheel trucks 6-33 inch max or metric equivalent.
- 15. Wheelbase; The truck must retain the original factory wheelbase and track width. OEM factory dual wheel trucks are permitted. Conversions must be factory OEM parts.
- 16. Hitch; The hitch must be receiver style hitch, solid mounted, ridged in all directions. Receiver rear bracket must be mounted and attached no more than 8 inches forward of the rear of the frame. Reinforcement are permitted. Reinforcements must not extend forward of the center line of the rear axle. Trick hitches prohibited. The hooking point must be the rear most point on the truck and must be rearward of the stock location of the tailgate. The hitch must be horizontal to the ground and stationary in all directions. The hitch's height may not exceed 26 inches. The hooking point must have a minimum 3075 inch inside diameter opening for the sled hook. The hooking point will be measured from the center of the clevis loop. Reece receiver with solid square shaft, clevis is allowed if using DMI or solid shaft. 26-inch hitch height.
- 17. Steering; The vehicle must retain the full OEM steering gear and power steering assistance if so equipped. Additional stabilizers are permitted. Non-OEM power assist prohibited.
- 18. Batteries; Batteries must be securely mounted. They are prohibited from being in the driver compartment or forward of the radiator core support.
- 19. Brakes; Four-wheel hydraulic brakes are mandatory.
- 20. Cooling system; Radiator must be in stock location and be of stock size.
- 21. Interior; A complete interior, including dashboard, door panels, headliner, etc. is mandatory. All factory controls must be retained and operative (lights, signals horn, wipers, etc.). No hand throttles. If truck equipped with heavy tinted windows they must be rolled down during hook.
- 22. Street Equipment; Complete headlight and taillight assemblies are mandatory and must be operative. OEM windshield and windows are mandatory. Windows must work.
- 23. Driver restraint; OEM restraint system is mandatory and must be used.
- 24. Ballast; Front weight bracket and suitcase weights are permitted. No weight boxes. No weights in cab. Weights in bed must be secured. Weights may be no more than 60 inches forward of the centerline of front axle. Loss of weight under green flag will result in disqualification.
- 25. Fire extinguishing; A fire extinguishing system is permitted and should be securely mounted.
- 26. Fuel additives: Water injection, Nitrous, propane or any other oxygen extenders is prohibited. All system components must be unplugged or removed from truck.
- 27.Kill switch; A Kill switch is required.
- 28. Tow vehicle; Tow vehicle are prohibited, you are not allowed to pull truck up to track with vehicle.
- 29. Weight; 8500 # with driver.

8500 LB 4X4 RULES STOCK DIESEL

BALLAST: Ballast can be added to the truck and must be secured. No weights in the passenger compartment. No hanging weights forward of the front bumper, bumper be in the factory location. No loaded front bumpers.

Minimum clearance is 8" from the bottom of the weight to the ground.

BATTERIES: The batteries must be securely mounted. They may not be located in the driver compartment or forward of the radiator core support.

BODY: The body must be the OEM truck body, including the full bed floor. The body must retain full sheet metal. Metal after-market hoods are permitted. Fiberglass is prohibited. The hood must be closed and securely latched while the vehicle is hooked to the sled. The complete OEM firewall and OEM floor pan is mandatory. Rear seat cannot be removed. Must have 2 fully upholstered matching front seats.

BUMPERS: Front tube type bumpers must not be filled with lead, concrete or any type of ballast. A minimum of ¼" inspection hole must be provided. If you have a homemade front bumper that is considered ballast you will be bumped to the WS class.

BRAKES: Four-wheel hydraulic brakes are mandatory.

CHASSIS: The OEM chassis is mandatory. The engine must be in the OEM location for the body used. The vehicle must retain the full OEM chassis. Wheel tubs, back-half conversions, tube chassis, etc., are prohibited.

COOLING SYSTEMS: Radiators must be in the stock location and be of at least stock size

DRIVELINE: An OEM transmission and transfer case are mandatory. They must have been an option on a one-ton or smaller pickup of matching brand.

DRIVER RESTRAINT SYSTEM: The OEM restraint system is mandatory and must be worn.

ENGINE: The engine is limited to a stock-appearing, OEM make-specific

compression ignition engine. Same brand as chassis.

NITROUS OXIDE: is prohibited along with other oxygen extenders as well as the use of PROPANE is also prohibited. All system components MUST be removed from the vehicle.

EXHAUST: The exhaust must exit rearward and vertical of the driver's compartment. Stacks exiting through the hood or fender well are prohibited. If the muffler or catalytic converter have been changed from stock, two 3/8-inch diameter bolts must be installed through the exhaust pipe in a cross pattern within one inch of each other within 4 inches of the turbo.

FUEL: The fuel must be pump #1/#2 diesel only. Soy/Biodiesel fuel is permitted.

FUEL INJECTION PUMP: The fuel injection pump is limited to a stock-appearing, OEM engine model-specific pump only. The use of multiple high-pressure common-rail fuel pumps is prohibited. Power stroke engines with a single factory turbo may not utilize a second-High Pressure Oil Pump. Pumps from different years in the same engine model may be interchanged.

FUEL SYSTEM: The OEM fuel tank is mandatory and must be used. Racing fuel cells are prohibited and must be removed from the vehicle.

HARMONIC BALANCER: All engines turning 4500 RPM and higher must be equipped with a harmonic balancer or damper meeting SFI Spec 18.1.

HITCH: The hitch must be a receiver-style hitch, must be ridged in all directions; reinforcements are permitted. Reinforcements must not extend forward of the centerline of the rear axle. Trick hitches are prohibited. The hooking point must be the rear-most point on the vehicle and must be rearward of the stock location of the tailgate. The hitch must be horizontal to the ground and stationary in all directions. Bumpers may be notched but not removed. The hitch's height from the ground may not exceed 26 inches on 4wd units and 30 inches on 2wd units. The hooking point must have a minimum 3.750-inch inside diameter opening for the sled hook. The hooking point will be measured to the center of the clevis loop.

INTERIOR: A complete interior, including dashboard, door panels, headliner, etc., is mandatory. Two matching front seats are mandatory. Aftermarket seats are permitted; they must be fully upholstered. All factory controls (lights, signals, horn, windows, wipers, etc.) must be retained and be operative. The use of hand-throttle controls is prohibited.

REAR END: Non-OEM rear-end housings are prohibited. It must have been an option on a one-ton or smaller pick up. Rear axle bolts must be covered by a cap or shield.

STEERING: The vehicle must retain the full, original OEM steering gear. The

vehicle must retain the original OEM power steering assistance, if it was so equipped. Additional stabilizers are permitted. Non- OEM power assist methods are prohibited.

STREET EQUIPMENT: Complete headlight and taillight assemblies (all) are mandatory and must be operative.

Complete OEM windshield and windows are mandatory. Windows must be operative per factory specifications; that is, they must open and close via OEM electrical or mechanical means.

SUSPENSION, FRONT: The upper mounting point for strut assemblies must be in the factory location. Adjustable caster/camber pillow ball mounts are permitted. The lower control arm may be strengthened provided factory-mounting points to chassis are maintained. The lower mounting point for the strut assembly may be modified for improved caster or camber. Strut tower braces, lower tie bars, sway bars, and limit straps are permitted. Traction bars and devices are not permitted.

SUSPENSION, REAR: An OEM-style suspension is mandatory. Lowering or raising the vehicle height with suspension modifications is permitted. Traction bars and devices are permitted; they must be bolt-on only; welds are permitted for attachment to frame or axle housing. All OEM suspension mounting points must be retained and used. Sway bars, limit straps, and camber kits are permitted. All rear suspensions must use at least one working shock absorber per wheel. NO airbag spring assistance is permitted; airbag compressors must be disconnected and bags deflated. Tires: The tires must be DOT street tires. Cut tires are prohibited.

TOW VEHICLES: Tow vehicles are prohibited to the starting line. It is permitted to tow your vehicle to the event in case of breakage.

TRANSFER CASE: Non-OEM transfer cases are prohibited. The transfer case must have been an option on a one-ton or smaller pickup truck of matching type.

TRANSMISSION, AUTOMATIC: Non-OEM transmissions are prohibited. Aftermarket torque converters, valve bodies and internal components are permitted. Transmission brakes are prohibited. A functional neutral safety switch is mandatory. All transmission lines must be metallic or high-pressure-type hose.

TRANSMISSION, MANUAL: Non-OEM transmissions are prohibited. Aftermarket internal components are permitted. A clutch meeting minimum SFI Spec 1.1 or 1.2 is mandatory on all vehicles with engines running 4500 RPM or more. All manual transmissions must be clutch assisted.

TURBOCHARGER: Limited to a stock OEM single turbocharger in one ton and under trucks (6.4 powerstrokes may run factory compounds with factory inducer size). Turbo must be mounted in the stock location and must be same make as OEM(Example: LLY turbo allowed on an LBZ), maximum size of the compressor is 63.5 mm. Aftermarket and Billet wheels are PROHIBITED. Inducer bore must be true bore, no plugs, no reducers. Compressor wheel must protrude into the inducer bore. Must measure the same size before and after the MAP groove. No clipped wheels allowed. All air must enter through the inducer bore. Induced bore must be measured with a go-no-go gauge or plug and bore will be checked with bore scope or caliper set to specification. The plug is 2.550 inches, L5P Duramaxes can run factory Billet wheel. Tech inspector has final discretion on turbo ruling.

WATER INJECTION: Water injection is prohibited. All system components must be removed from the truck.

WHEELBASE: The vehicle must retain the original factory wheelbase and track width.

GRACE: Vehicle is allowed 1 grace hook per year.

HOT STREET GAS - 6800 LBS CLASS

- 1. Truck must be one ton or smaller, 496 CID max.
- 2. Engine and Transmission and Rear end must match the make of truck. Axles must be one ton or less.
- 3. Engine can run a dual plane intake (Edelbrock performer, factory stock, Weiand street warrior) May run a spread bore intake. With no vacuum restriction. Engine that run a single plane intake must pull 13 inches of vacuum at 1000 rpm's.
- 4. Must run OEM cast iron heads & Block out of production vehicle. Headers are allowed with 3" collector. exhaust, must have a type of muffler and exit behind the cab.
- 5. All engine acc. Must be belt driven off the crank (water pump, alternator, power steering). A/C compressor may be removed or unhooked. Electric fans may be used.
- 6. Aftermarket ignition may be used no larger than MSD 6AL or equivalent.
- 7. Fuel Requirements, If it can be purchased at a pump, it is allowed. E85 blend is allowed. NO INJECTABLES.
- 8. Turbochargers and / or superchargers are not allowed unless it came equipped from the factory.
- 9. Max 4150 carburetor, no larger than 1 3/4 " butterflies in base plate. Fuel injection may be run, and must use a factory fuel injection system with factory intake and throttle body no larger than 92mm. Performance fuel pumps and filters are allowed. Fuel lines no larger than 3/8" ID. (1 supply line, 1 return line)

- 10. Fuel cells allowed. Must mounted in bed.
- 11. Wheel base Can not be longer than a factory crew cab long bed
- 12. No gutting or cutting allowed.
- 13. Front and rear factory suspension components, including unaltered spring packs must be retained. Extended bump stops or blocks may be used and must be removable.
- 14. Brakes must present and working on all 4 corners.
- 15. Front and rear traction bars are allowed, must be bolted in and removable.
- 16. Must run removable reese style hitch mounted to the rear of the frame rails. With no structures from the hitch to axle. No drawbar type or mid mount hitches. Hook point must protrude beyond the stock length frame rails and bed floor, distance from hook point to center rear axle must be no less than 42" maximum 26" hitch height.
- 17. Must run solid receiver 2" or larger with hood point minimum 3.5 hole. Maximum thickness of 1.5 x 1.5.
- 18. Tires and wheels must be DOT approved unaltered, and street legal. No Duals.
- 19. Can run weights on the front of truck IF they are behind grill or bumper, and must NOT be seen. (MUST APPEAR STOCK)
- 20. Each truck may only be entered once in the class for scoring purposes. If additional hooks are desired, it is up to the tech officials whether or not to allow additional exhibition hooks.
- 21. Must have safety chains or loops around driveshafts.

SUPER STOCK 2WD RULES

- 1. Engine- 530 cubic inch limit. Top 3 trucks will be pump tested at the end of the year. Refusal to allow pump test will result in Disqualification from Points and will only be allowed to pull exhibition following year.
- 2. Natuarally aspirated single carb, no power adders
- 3. Engine Heads- Ford engines must run a cast iron head only BBC engines must run a conventional style 24 degree head, no spread port or raised intake runners.
- 4. Tire Size-Must be a DOT approved tire, 35x 12.50 or equivalent as marked by DOT
- 5. Hitch- Hook point must be a minimum 20" from the center of rear axle, must be pinned from the center of the rear axle or back, must be rigid in all directions before, during and after the pull. Must be safe to pull. Hitch height of 26 inches.
- 6. Wheel base- 140 inches
- 7. No Tube built chassis.
- 8. No planetary rear ends.
- 9. No Lift bodies.
- 10. Truck must have working brakes.
- 11. Must have S.F.I. approved flywheel, harmonic balancer and bellhousing or blanket.
- 12. Must have working kill switch at rear of truck.
- 13. Must have driveshaft loops and u-joint shields.
- 14. Must have full firewall and floorboards equal to OEM. Open holes in firewall must be covered.
- 15. All fuel lines must be approved for fuel use.
- 16. Must have functioning fire extinguisher and be accessible to driver.
- 17. Tech committee and Judges have final decision on Rules.
- 18. No rule changes for 4 yrs- October, 2026 expiration of these rules.


